Program Chair (and VP) Bill Desmarais will present on the dinosaur paleontology work he did this past summer with Pete Larson of the Black Hills Institute. They identified a new species of brachiosaurus, from the Waugh Quarry in Wyoming, by removing a 62-inch scapula (shoulder blade). Bill will also show pictures of Pete Larson's incredible home tucked away in the Black Hills of South Dakota.

This year Bill celebrated his 25th wedding anniversary with his wife Karen. They celebrated this milestone by traveling to Hawaii in late May and early June. Always the paleontologist, Bill will also present the wonders of our 50th state. Some examples are the world's tallest and largest mountains, an active volcano, the House of the Sun, and many cultural and historic sites and events such as Pearl Harbor. The next Board Meeting will be held Tuesday, October 2, at 7:15 PM at the home of Marv and Sue Houg.





1. Thursday - Sept 13 7:00 p.m. University of Iowa Museum of Natural History UI Explorers Seminar: Samuel James, Biology

"Earthworms from sea level to treetops: they are not all the same"

Samuel James' exploration of earthworm diversity has been motivated by a desire to discover the evolutionary history of earthworms, and to compare that history with the history of the landmasses on which they live. He is also interested in discovery and description of species of earthworms and has published a fair number of new species over the years. In this talk Samuel will show some of the surprising diversity of earthworm locations, lifestyles, and colors. Samuel's latest estimate of the evolutionary history of earthworms will serve as a starting point for discussion of some surprising distributions, which may eventually shed some light on land area relationships.

- There are no bathrooms so plan accordingly
- Make sure you bring plenty of water to drink, and food as needed.

The Raymond Quarry is one mile east of Raymond Iowa, 6900 Dubuque Road (old Hwy 20).

To get there: Take Hwy 380/20 to Raymond Iowa; take Raymond exit and go north to the stop Sign - Dubuque Road. Turn right - east and go one mile. The quarry is on your right - South side of the road.

Please Note: Hwy 20/380 in this area has been under construction so check your maps & highway routing before leaving and plan travel time accordingly.

Items found in the past: Calcite vugs ranging in color from light to golden brown to purple to black, with some containing pyramidal and octahedral pyrite, and barite. Fluorite vugs have been found as well as an occasional fossil. We will be working the rip-rap piles so rock hammers, crack & sledge hammers are very useful, pry bars if you need to roll over a boulder & can't lift or roll it.

REQUIRED!! For This Field Trip

Hard Hat, Safety Glasses, Class II Bright Orange or Lime Green Safety Vest, Jeans, Work Boots (Steel toe even better) - NO Open Toed Shoes, sandals or floppies etc. Gloves are a good idea. You can pick up these items at Menards, Home Depot, Payless, Ace Hardware etc. Cost: Hard Hat - \$3 to \$5, Orange safety hunting/work vest - \$3 to \$5. If you have questions, don't/can't find the equipment - call me as the club does have extra hard hats, vests & safety glasses etc., but I need to know how many to bring. The Basic Materials Rock Hound Club Card must be with you at all times in the Quarry. If you just signed up and don't have it yet, then I do have a signed copy of the application as well as blank waiver forms with me that can be signed at the gate so you will be ok to go in. You must be a member in good standing with Black Hawk Gem and Mineral Society or Central Iowa Mineral Society, i.e. your dues paid for this year(can be paid at the gate). If You Do Not Have All The Above Items, Call Me because You Do NOT GO IN Without Them!

FIELD TRIP TO CONKLIN QUARRY SUNDAY, Oct.14

Meet at the main entrance to Conklin at 8:45 to sign in and get safety instructions. Enter the quarry at 9:00. This is a lock-in quarry; that is, the gate is locked behind us and no one can enter or leave (except in an emergency) until noon, when a group will be let out. Others can come in at that time if they are waiting at the gate. The rest of the group will leave at about 4:00.

This is a "hard-rock" working quarry. All field trippers should have the appropriate safety equipment, such as hard hat, eye protection and steel-toed or other sturdy shoes. All children should be closely supervised. Possible finds include: millerite, coral heads, horn corals, brachiopods, bryozoans, trilobites, crinoids and maybe cephalopods, fish parts, and blastoids. Useful tools include: rock hammers, cold chisels, sledges and pry bars. Bring your own water and lunch.

You must be a member of CVRMS or MAPS to attend this field trip but you can join at the gate.

Tips from a Jeweler's Bench By Brad Smith

PICKLE PROBLEMS

Dropping a hot item into the pickle after soldering causes a hiss that sends small droplets of the acid pickle into the air. This will rust your nearby tools and can't be all that good to breathe either. My solution is to use a coffee cup of water next to my solder block to quench the piece before dropping it in the pickle.

Also, a hot pickle pot gives off fumes that bother me in my home workshop. I get around that by using my pickle cold. I mix it a little stronger than with a hot pot so that it works about as quickly. I keep it in a large-mouth peanut butter bottle and cap it off whenever I'm done using it.

MODIFY TOOLS FOR PRONG SETTING

When setting stones in a prong mount avoid slipping by grinding a groove in the face of your prong pusher or one jaw of your flat-nose pliers. Easiest way to cut the slot on the pusher is with a file, and the easiest way to cut the slot on your pliers is with a cutoff wheel in the Foredom.

USE A SPRAY BOTTLE

Those little spray bottles you can find at the drug store are great for firescale preventors and debubbling solutions. A quick firescale preventor is liquid flux, and a homemade debubbling solution is a little Dawn liquid in rubbing alcohol.

BROKEN DRILLS

Have you ever broken a drill bit off in a hole? Sometimes you can grab it with pliers, but other times the steel piece is below the surface in the hole. If this happens, you can usually dissolve the steel in a solution of alum. Alum is typically available from a food store or a drug store. Use about a teaspoon per cup of warm water. Submerge your piece so that the partially drilled hole is facing up to let the bubbles float free and not block the hole.

Tips from Phil Oliver

COPPER CLEANING

When I take a piece of shiny copper to a show; most people pick it up and ask "how did you clean it?". They are not interested in buying it. The following are cleaning instructions given buy Keweenaw Gem and Gift:

- 1, Take a piece of shiny Remove to any unwanted rock by picking and hammering the specimen. Use a wire brush to remove loose, soft material. Wash with high pressure water.
- 2, Soak copper in dilute muriatic acid (hydrochloride) for approximately 1 hour. If lots of green oxidation is present, use a longer acid dip. Sometimes toilet bowl cleaners contain this acid. Muratic acid is available at your local hardware store. Dilute.about 4 parts water and 1 part acid; **ALWAYS** add acid to the water.
- 3, Rinse well and brush the copper and rock again to remove any further loose rock material. Wash with high pressure water. Use a final rinse with distilled water.
- 4, Dip the copper in dilute nitric acid (30 seconds to 1 minute MAXIMUM). This is a very strong acid, so be prepared. Wear goggles, rubber gloves, and use only in a well ventilated area OUTDOORS ONLY!! Keep running water nearby to rinse spills, splashes on the ground or clothing. Dilute 70% nitric acid with 6 parts water and 1 part acid. 70% nitric acid is available over the internet through ebay.

Rinse the copper many times until no acid remains on or in the copper specimen (15-30 minutes). Rinse one last time with distilled hot water prior to using the Copper Dip.

5, Dip copper into solution of copper dip about 5 to 10 seconds. Copper dip is available from Keweenaw Gem and Gift. Any liquid brass/copper cleaner that contains chromium (very toxic) will work.

RINSE, RINSE, RINSE (1-2 hours if needed).

Rinse until no yellowish coloration remains in the rinse water. Dry with a towel, hair dryer or fan.

6, Spray with clear acrylic lacquer one day after copper has been cleaned and dried. If the copper tarnishes, redo the process. Too weak acids/or not enough rinses are the primary problems that causes tarnishing.

Precautions

Always wear goggles, rubber gloves and an apron.

Keep running water close by to dilute and rinse spills.

Use well-labeled plastic containers. Cover when not in use.

All acid work must be done outdoors away from children and animals.

Dilute all solutions with lots of water before disposable. Follow recommendations of local state and federal regulations for disposal.

LAKE SUPERIOR AGATE - WHAT IT'S WORTH

The current wholesale market starts from about 50¢ per pound for tumbling grade up to over \$ 1000 per pound for the better agates. One needs a method to figure their value. I use 7 different categories; assign a number value to each number and then calculate their product. The following are the different categories and methods for assigning values.

1. Weight in ounces (larger agates are worth more so the bigger ones are given bonus points)
